Explores the stories of 30 remarkable kids, whose passions led to lifesaving medical treatments, revolutionary inventions, and history-making achievements.

The Big Book of Monsters by Hal Johnson - J 001.944 JOH

Meet the monsters in this who's who of the baddest of the bad! Like those supernatural beasts everyone knows and fears-the bloodsucking vampire, Count Dracula, and that eight-foot-tall mash-up of corpses, Frankenstein's Monster.


